Symposium Barcelona 2018

This is the third Annual Report the Board presents to the Association and covers the period 1 July 2018 to 30 June 2019. The highlight of the year was the Symposium in Universitat Pompeu Fabra in



Barcelona in October. Over fifty people attended the symposium, which focused on multilingualism and multilingual policies, addressing the singularity of particular academic contexts. Naturally participants also discussed the challenge posed by the continuing growth of English-medium instruction, especially its effects on the domestic languages. What kind of balance would be optimal in what context? The issues are sure to be in the spotlight at the

6th Conference. The Board warmly thanks **Manuel Jímenez** and **Mireia Calm** and their team for the super organization.

SIGs and Regional Groups

One of the objectives the Board had during the year was to stimulate the creation of groups of members with like-minded interests as well as regional groups. The PhD SIG has been ticking along – most of its activities take place during the conference, and it is very encouraging that so many PhD students are presenting here. The PhD SIG would welcome every PhD student in the SIG where information about research practices and methodologies can be exchanged and research progress shared.

The Board congratulates PhD members who have successfully defended their theses during the year: **Samantha Curle**, **Lijie Shao**, **Joan Ploettner**, among others.

Regional groups have been started in Asia and Spain. The ICLHE East Asia Regional group organized by **Annette Bradford** and **Ted O'Neill** held a highly successful one-day symposium in Tokyo in January and they are planning to hold a second one early next year. The Spain group is coming together for the first time at this conference. We look forward to hearing much from these groups, especially as they constitute core regions for the development of education through the integration of content and language — or should we say languages?

Website

After conferences and similar activities, the website should be the most visible face of an educational association like ours. The Board is very happy that during the past year the ICLHE website was



upgraded and the Member Zone created. It was pleasing to see initially plenty of announcements on the website, but increasingly technical issues kept arising. Eventually finding solutions took far more time than our website officer, **Jenny Valcke**, could reasonably invest, as well as becoming more and more technologically complex. The Board opted to hire the services of a technical website

administrator, **Deirdre Curle**, who is now managing the website and the administration side of the membership for the Association. Already we are seeing many improvements, which should now reflect in a better service to members.

The Member Zone exists, but there has been little response so far concerning information from members to place there. There are a few articles in the resources, though calls to members for others have so far met with little response. It would be useful to include a simple list of articles written and presentations given by members: this could be an effective way of disseminating your research and observations among the members of the association.

As the Treasurer, **Ute Smit**, will report in more detail, much of the expenditure has been on necessary administrative matters to ensure that the Association can run smoothly. Such matters have preoccupied the Board during the past year.

At the previous AGM, the Board invited SIGs and Regional groups, among others, to apply for small grants that could be used, for example, to help organize meetings or contribute to honoraria to invited speakers. The Board extends the invitation.

Your Board

During the year, the Board held six online meetings and two face-to-face during the Barcelona Symposium. A glance at the minutes of these meetings reveals the challenge of technical matters in

getting things to work! Hopefully, Board members can now devote more time to matters of ICLHE content rather than administration.

The AGM at Castellón will see elections to the Board for the first time since its establishment. The Board looks forward to seeing some new faces from the membership.



Our membership secretary, **Kevin Haines**, is stepping down to focus on work commitments and projects. The Association will join with the Board in warmly thanking Kevin for his steadfast commitment to the Association and his hard work in getting the membership system soundly organized. The technical issues have consumed a lot of time, and hopefully a new membership secretary can now concentrate more on recruitment and matters of content rather than the technology.

Board members are very busy people, often with a multiplicity of commitments to their university and to international projects. The time they can work as volunteer leaders for the Association is naturally limited. It is easy to suggest ideas for what the Association can do, but often in order to do it, someone has to step forward! Both the existing Board and no doubt the new Board to be installed at this AGM would welcome active contribution from members. With this in mind, the Board is hoping to establish committees in the coming months and will reach out to members to serve on these committees.

Overall it is valuable to consider the future directions for the Association. What does the Association do well? What should it be doing, and perhaps more importantly, what should it not be doing? Where do we want it to go from here? Where should we be in five years' time?

The call, launched in September, remains open till early November and invites contributions to "Internationalisation and English medium education: language, policy and practice".
